Serpent on the Staff -- a Hardcover Bargain

Barnes and Nobles is offering through its "Books by Mail" a sale price on the hard cover version of *The Serpent on the Staff: The Unhealthy Politics of the AMA* by Chicago Sun-Times reporters Howard Wolinsky and Tom Brune. The book, which details the inside workings of the AMA, got mass media attention when it was released in 1994. The book includes a chapter that chronicles the AMA's campaign against chiropractic.
