

NHSU Honors Foot Levelers for Support of Chiropractic Education

Kent Greenawalt, president and CEO of Foot Leveler's, Inc., received Northwestern Health Sciences University's President's Award at the university's second annual President's Invitational Golf Tournament on Aug. 30. In addition, the company recently donated more than \$37,00 in seminar proceeds to chiropractic colleges. Foot Levelers traditionally dedicates the funds from its education division to support new DCs.
